St Aidan's Sixth Form Ski Trip to Aprica, Italy – 15 February 2020 to 22 February 2020

Following our very successful Sixth Form skiing trip over half term, we are proposing a return trip, this time to Aprica in Italy, departing on Saturday 15 February 2020 and returning on Saturday 22 February 2020.

Situated on the stunning mountains of Valtellina, Aprica is a truly stunning natural plateau between imposing mountain ranges in Italy. The slopes are at altitudes between 1,200 and 2,300 metres, allowing skiers to descend directly from the top of the mountain to the skiing grounds in Aprica resort offers 21 pistes with a total length of 40 km and is an inviting atmosphere to make skiers feel at home.

The cost of the trip to be in the region of £1335.00 and £1370.00 and includes:

- Return coach transfers in the UK and Italy
- Flights, airport taxes and **full insurance** for winter sports
- Full board hotel accommodation (3-course evening meal and hot lunches taken at the hotel)
- 5 hours of ski instruction with qualified instructors on each of the 6 skiing days
- Full ski pass for 6 days and hire of skis, boots and helmets for 6 days
- Après ski entertainment including night skiing, ice-skating and swimming.

Revision advice

This advice is the result of research about effective learning methods: we hope that you find it useful and that it will help you to be more effective in your revision than reading through your notes or highlighting, which are popular but less successful approaches.

This week: Concrete Examples


Learning abstract concepts or 'big ideas' is all well and good but often we struggle to relate them to other things. By using concrete examples, you will be able to create a much stronger representation of that concept and be able to use it in a range of situations.

So you have learned lots of material, you have asked important questions about that material and elaborated on its wider implications but what do you do next? Does this always transfer into exam results? Not always. Having lots of information and ideas swirling around your head doesn't always mean you can get it down in an exam in a way that will succeed.

One of the most effective things you can do is to get concrete examples of abstract ideas you have learned in class. For example,

Osmosis

Water moves from where there is high water potential (a lot of free water and a low concentration of solute) to an area of low water potential (little free water and a high concentration of a solute).



Another useful way to use concrete examples is to study the best possible example of the thing you are trying to do, such as writing an essay.

It's very difficult to be excellent if you don't know what excellence looks like.

By evaluating an A or A* essay and taking it apart or 'reverse engineering it' you will begin to learn how to put together all the information you have learned with the bigger concepts and ideas that underpin it. Ask yourself:

- 1. How have they structured the essay?
- 2. What particular phrases have they used to discuss their ideas?
- 3. What specific examples have they used as evidence to support their arguments?

Concrete Examples: linking abstract concepts with concrete examples helps you form real-world examples of success.
