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Junior Maths success!



We were delighted to see over 44% of our Year 7 and 8 entrants to the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge achieve certificates, compared to a figure of 40% nationally. 8 of our students achieved the highest Gold award, these were: Henry Beagley, Matthew Bunkle, Harry Tanner, Annabel Tiffin, Eliza Corbett, Jonathan Easo from Year 7, and Oscar Potter and Ollie Holt from Year 8. Oscar Potter (Y8), Henry Beagley, Matthew Bunkle and Harry Tanner(Y7) further qualified for the Kangaroo round with all four being awarded certificates. The Junior Kangaroo is a follow-on round to the Junior Mathematical Challenge. It is a 60-minute, multiple-choice challenge consisting of 25 problems. Only the top 3% of students from the Junior Mathematical Challenge qualify to take part in the Junior Kangaroo so this is a huge achievement. Henry and Oscar both jointly achieved Best In School.

Well done to everyone who entered the original competition and particular congratulations to all those who were awarded certificates.

Work experience

Throughout the last 3 weeks of term over 120 companies in Harrogate, York, Leeds and beyond have been supporting Year 11 students on work experience. Staff visiting the placements have received overwhelmingly positive feedback - students have universally reported increased confidence and insight into the world of work and testimonials from employers have included the following comments: '... a delightful student who has put 100% effort into everything she's done. Year 8 responded brilliantly, drawing on their knowledge of studying the Sikh religion in RS to ask everything from are you a vegetarian through to have you ever been bullied because of your faith. We all appreciated Dr Singh's openness and honesty - which extended to showing us how long his turban is and proving that he can tie it in 35 seconds - and look forward to welcoming him back to St Aidan's next year.

Author visits Year 12

Over the last couple of weeks, we English A-level students have enjoyed participating in a number of sessions with inspirational writers. As well as being a great support for our NEAs, the sessions provided a lot of insight for aspiring writers and prospective English undergraduates. The students showed off their fantastic skills in the first group by making Venison Calzone, Greek Salad, Fluffy Pancakes with fruit skewers and Strawberry and Yorkshire Rhubarb Icecream. The second group made delicious Duck Stuffed Crust Pizza, Pear Flan and Parmesan potatoes served with homemade garlic mayonnaise. Steph and the audience were really impressed with their knowledge, skills and enthusiasm to produce such complex recipes in such a short time.

Michelin starred chef Shaun Rankin was also on the programme, alongside our ex student and apprentice chef Ollie Wenn. Ollie met Steph Moon when he won the same competition 4 years ago and started to develop his career as a chef. He worked on lots of projects with Steph and at Rudding Park before leaving school and starting his professional apprenticeship. Ollie made two delicious and stunning dishes, Pheasant Summer Rolls with hoi sin and Rudding Park Kitchen Garden herbs and edible flowers, and a Venison Tartare with gherkin gel, caramelised onions and red mustard frill. We are so grateful to Steph Moon who really has inspired our young chefs at St Aidan's - one Year 8 who was involved in the cookery demo at the Great Yorkshire Show emailed the teacher with the following words: "When I chose my year 9 subjects I dropped food but now I know what I do in year 9 and the amount of fun I had at the Yorkshire show cooking it changed my mind ".







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London Politics trip




We took 44 Politics and History Year 12 students to London for a two-night stay in mid-July. Our first stop was at the Imperial War Museum, where we had a chance to explore the various exhibits and galleries. From there it was a short walk to the London Eve where we enjoyed some fine panoramic views of the city. A visit to watch Mamma Mia rounded off the day. We began the next day with a visit to the gates of Downing Street after which we bumped into Business Secretary Kwasi Kwarteng, who kindly stopped for a photo while striding purposefully towards the entrance of Parliament. A short while later on our tour of Westminster we looked down from the Public Gallery to watch questions being put to the Business Secretary: we now understood his rush. The tour was followed by an interactive workshop on law-making and a Q&A with Harrogate MP Andrew Jones. We then walked to the Treasury where former student Matthew Beer now works as a policy advisor. It was fascinating to see civil servants at work and also the Chancellor's office. We then enjoyed some time in Covent Garden before watching The Play That Goes Wrong. The final day included a trip to the wonderful Churchill War Rooms followed by some shopping time on Oxford Street. Although London was parched by the heatwave, it did not mar the enthusiasm of the students, who relished the mixture of political and historical interest alongside the more relaxed and fun elements.

Slapton Sands Trip



After a very early 4.30am meet time, a group of 37 Year 12 Geographers set off on a 9 hour journey to the south coast of Devon. The aim was to spend 4 days in the area around Slapton Sands carrying out fieldwork for the Non-Examined Assessment (NEA). This NEA is worth 20% of their A-level and involves students creating a unique title to investigate a part of their Geography course in more detail. In the first two days students were given the chance to recce various locations in the area including the tiny village of Slapton, the coastal villages of Torcross and Beesands and the stunning shingle ridge that runs along the coast in front of Slapton Ley, a freshwater lake and Site of Special Scientific Interest just metres behind the beach. Once we'd seen the area, the students got to work refining their titles and designing their data collection methods. On the morning of Day 3 everyone set off, determined to collect every piece of data that was needed for their title, but collaborating and supporting one another in their teams. The students worked hard, and despite the scorchingly hot conditions, everyone managed to get the information they needed.

As teachers, we could not have been prouder of our 6th formers, the work they completed, their kindness to one another and their wonderfully positive attitudes. We hope the students had a great time too!

EcoClub waste tips

Batteries are part of our every day life, but did you know there are serious problems from not disposing of these correctly? 20,000 tonnes of batteries go to landfill every year. They contain toxic metals and chemicals that pollute the environment such as mercury, zinc and lithium. Not only this, but dead batteries can be damaging to your health - your eyes, skin and even your lungs. In Knaresborough, a bin lorry actually set on fire because somebody put their laptop battery in the wrong bin!

This can easily be avoided by recycling your used batteries. It's easy to do and there are lots of collection points in the local community. Save used batteries up at home and you can drop them off at most supermarkets, schools or DIY stores to recycle. All Cancer Research stores have them too, where they are actually paid £100 per tonne collected, so you can recycle and support a charity too!
