Junior Music Residential





On the weekend of January 27th to 29th 48 young musicians took part in St. Aidan's annual junior music residential in York. The focus of the weekend was making music together and we calculated that we crammed in the equivalent of 10 weeks of rehearsal time throughout the weekend. This allowed the Junior Band and the String Ensemble to make outstanding progress, polishing existing pieces and learning brand new repertoire for a concert on Sunday afternoon.

Being away from home for two nights also gave the students a fantastic opportunity to develop their wider skills, learning to participate and co-operate in line with the school's 'WALK' mission - (Wisdom, Aspiration, Learning well together and Kindness).

It is always a privilege to work with St. Aidan's students and to see friendships developing within the St. Aidan's musical family. As well as making music we found the time to play games, to take part in the traditional 'Aidan's got Talent' show, to go bowling (Mrs Elliott won the staff competition!!!), to hunt treasure and to generally socialise and relax together as well as eating meals and worshipping together.

Students' attitudes and behaviour were exemplary throughout the weekend, and they were a real credit to their families and the school. Thanks are also due to all the staff who facilitated this trip. All members of the music department were there as well as Ms. Johnson, the string teacher but a special mention must be made for Mr. Taylor, Head of Year 7, who gave up a weekend at home with his family to support the trip despite having, in his words, 'not a musical bone in his body'. Thanks also to Mrs McDonald who did so much work behind the scenes to organise the trip.

The concert was held in the Church of the Holy Redeemer. This is an amazing building designed by the same architect as Coventry Cathedral using reclaimed medieval stonework from a 10th Century Church that had fallen into disrepair. Unfortunately, their heating had also fallen into disrepair, but the musicians and audience braved the cold to create an outstanding concert which highlighted the work of the young people, the progress that the ensembles had made and brought warmth to our hearts if not our extremities! Plans are already underway for next year's residential.





Physics Olympiad



On Friday 27th January, 57 of our Year 12 A Level students sat the BPhO's Online Senior Physics Challenge. The questions are mostly about physics ideas, but also allow students to demonstrate their wider reading and interest in the subject. It is a national physics competition and our school's entry made up over 1% of the entry.

Special mention should go to William Varley, Jerram Bishop and Ethan Cowell who achieved Gold Awards. A further 14 students achieved Silver; we also gained 37 Bronze and 3 Commendation Awards.

Andrew Jones MP Visit





On 27 January, Andrew Jones MP came to school to visit students in STEM related classes. After a chat with Mr Thornton, he joined Mr Wilson's Year 13 Physics class and asked students why they had chosen the subject and where they were going with it.

Mr Jones is concerned with the national shortage in students choosing STEM related careers and spoke of the struggle to fill jobs in this area. He was impressed with the St Aidan's students and commented on their sense of direction - most with a definite plan of how they would use their physics in degrees and careers.

He then moved onto Mr Kirkpatrick's Year 10 Engineering class where the students were making phone stands. He commented on the 'buzz around the workshop' and noticed how the students were learning to problem solve in their engineering work. Mr Jones was impressed at how the Year 10 boys spoke enthusiastically about their work and the prospects that were open to them in the future. They even enjoyed a photo opportunity before he left!

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Cross Country News: King Henry VIII School, Coventry, Relay

These races have become the unofficial national schools' XC relays over their 51 year history and are a superb event with teams travelling from all over England to compete. The standard is extremely high in both the girls' and boys' races, with young international athletes in many of the teams.

Our young boys' team did well to finish 26th out of 43, against teams full of sixth-form runners and our hope is that they'll do better and better as they continue to train and become stronger over the next few years. Our girls' B team were amazing and

finished 13th overall and fastest B team. However, the headlines have to go to our girls' A team.

Many schools send their fastest runner out on leg 1, so Elena Dickson (Year 10) did fantastically for the team to finish her leg of the relay in 6th place, before rushing off for a netball trial. With all of the top 10 teams within 90 seconds of each other Elena handed over to Ella Colbourn (Year 13) our 800m superstar who measured her effort really well and overtook 3 teams in the last kilometer of her leg to run the 10th fastest overall. Niamh Robinson (Year 10) on leg 3 set off just behind the 2nd place team and 200m behind the leading team. With a kilometre to go of her run, she took the lead and managed to stretch this lead out to just under 20 seconds over 2nd place Ratcliffe College and 3rd place Upton Hall School. Eve Whitaker (Year 13), European u20 Fell Running Silver medalist, had to try and hold off one of the fastest u17 cross country runners in the country from Ratcliffe College. Though Eve's lead had been cut to just 8 seconds by half-way round the relay leg, she ran the 5th fastest time of the day and held on for the team win against the best school teams in the country. They even ran the 3rd fastest time ever in the history of the race.
