 Creating opportunities for students to use lunch times and some WALK times to work with departmental staff on subject specific revision tips



| A Level courses | A minimum of 5 GCSE subjects at grade 5 |
| Applied courses | A minimum of 5 GCSE subjects at grade 4 |
| Resit GCSE courses | Depending on the overall profile of a student it may be possible to resit GCSE English and Mathematics as students who do not achieve grade 4 in GCSE English and Mathematics must include re-sit GCSE or equivalent courses as part of their programme |


